EXAMPLES OF MISBEHAVIOUR AND HOW TO DEAL WITH IT

Deliberately unfair or offensive behaviour is not common in table tennis and is usually limited to a small minority of players but its effects may be very damaging and it is often difficult to control. Because misbehaviour can take many forms it is difficult to lay down precise rules, and setting and applying acceptable standards of conduct is more a matter of judgment and common sense than of factual decision. Consistent application by umpires of the regulations concerning misbehaviour is very important. It is very frustrating for players, coaches and spectators to see one umpire dealing with misbehaviour in a fair and consistent manner in accordance with the Regulations, whilst also seeing another umpire completely ignore misbehaviour. The table shown below describes some examples of misbehaviour and suggested ways to deal with it, however you should remember that every situation is unique and you should use your judgement and common-sense (this does not mean that you can use this as a reason to ignore misbehaviour!).
