CHAIR'S WELCOME



Clare Briegal MBE – Chair, Table Tennis England

A very warm welcome to the 2025/26 Table Tennis England Annual Report.

It has certainly been a momentous year for the sport in this country, hosting the centenary ITTF World Team Table Tennis Championships Finals in London, the city which hosted the first in 1926.

I said in these notes last year that welcoming the world to London was a huge responsibility but also a wonderful opportunity to elevate our sport.

I believe those 13 days in April and May saw us deliver on both counts, confirming England as a nation which can be trusted to stage iconic table tennis events while also delivering a lasting impact at the grassroots and setting new standards for sustainability.

London 2026 cemented our status as an important and leading nation in the international table tennis landscape and the legacy will be felt for many years.

I would like to thank the ITTF for entrusting us with the centenary Championships and for the opportunity to host the ITTF AGM and summit in England. My sincere thanks to our sponsors, funders and partners for helping to make it possible and to the workforce and volunteers who made sure it all ran smoothly and delivered a memorable experience for everyone. Huge congratulations to the England athletes who showed – at the World Championships and at all the international competitions that they competed in around the globe this year – that they can mix it with the world's best. I am very proud of what we all achieved as a table tennis community.



While the World Championships was the focal point of the year, these pages illustrate and report on the full breadth and depth of our work across the country.

Like most National Governing Bodies, we face challenges, including ensuring financial sustainability and that we progress the delivery of our Table Tennis United strategic plan. Those challenges mean we need to prioritise effectively to ensure our work has a meaningful and lasting impact.

We need to listen to our membership more, not only through formal research and our recent membership survey, but also through our regular interactions with you, at competitions and at your clubs and leagues through the year. We are changing how we work with National Council to provide greater transparency and engagement with the senior volunteers who lead your clubs and counties. We must ensure we hear their views and that our activities are aligned with the needs of those they represent.

We have encouraged you, our individual members, to get involved with our committees and working groups through a major recruitment exercise. We simply cannot deliver our strategic plan without your involvement.

Our future success and growth as a sport will be built on a foundation of strong clubs and leagues. In order to grow, we need to attract new participants to our sport.

We must work together to create inclusive environments, at our clubs and leagues, and in all our activities. By ensuring that we welcome everyone to the table we may increase the diversity of our membership and create a sport that reflects society today and for tomorrow.

We must make our events, including our National Championships, something we can all be proud of and a showcase of table tennis excellence that attracts the best athletes and strong delivery partners and sponsors.

If we meet all these challenges with vision and commitment, then we will build a strong future based on the Table Tennis England values we have defined this year. These values were co-created by the staff and Board during a number of in-person workshops and online

sessions and reflect a culture that we wish to create at Table Tennis England. We plan to share our thoughts with our members in the 2026/27 season and have begun with some early briefings to National Council members.

The Board is focused on working collaboratively across the sport and within those values. This year, we welcomed Paul Bishop to the Board on a permanent basis and appointed Leanne O'Leary. They have taken on roles as Chair of the Finance and Audit Committee and Chair of the Risk and Governance Committee respectively. Ritchie Venner's first term also came to an end and he was re-elected for a second term. Thank you to the Board for your service and support to me in my first year as Chair.



I would like to thank our CEO Sally Lockyer and the Table Tennis England staff for their hard work and commitment over the past year. You should be proud of what you have achieved in this year of the World Championships in London - I recognise the huge pressure this put on everyone, whether you were directly involved in the delivery of the event or not.

I would also like to thank all those volunteers who put so much into our sport. The World Championships would not have been able to run as it did without the 363 people who gave their time and enthusiasm to be part of the volunteer team in London, and the same is true of many other facets of our sport. We simply could not do what we do without our volunteers, and it was fitting that we celebrated our Pride of Table Tennis Awards during London 2026 and that the finalists had the chance to watch the England team in action.

As I continue my second full year as Table Tennis England Chair, I look forward to meeting more of you and helping to continue to move our sport forward.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

It is a privilege to write my first full Chief Executive's Report for Table Tennis England, and to reflect on a year in which our sport has continued to move forward with confidence, energy and ambition.

When I joined the organisation, I spoke about the importance of listening carefully and working in partnership with the many people who make table tennis happen every week. That remains at the heart of our approach. Across clubs, leagues, counties, schools, performance environments and community settings, I have seen first-hand the passion, expertise and generosity which underpin our sport. I am hugely grateful to everyone who has welcomed me, shared their experiences and challenged us to keep improving.

The 2025/26 season has been a significant one for Table Tennis England. Guided by *Table Tennis United*, we have continued to focus on building a thriving community, strengthening the player pathway, developing our people and making the sport more visible, more inclusive and more connected. There is still much to do, but the direction of travel is hugely encouraging.



The major theme of the year has, of course, been London 2026. Hosting the ITTF World Team Table Tennis Championships Finals – the centenary Championships – was a huge honour and a once-in-a-generation opportunity. Delivering this iconic event was a mammoth team effort and my heartfelt thanks go to everyone who played their part.

London 2026 gave us a spotlight; our shared responsibility now is to turn that spotlight into long-term growth. The legacy of the event will come from how we use the moment to help more people play, watch, volunteer, coach and belong. It will come from stronger local connections, better digital journeys, clearer competition pathways and a sport which is welcoming to people of all ages, backgrounds and abilities.

It will also come in the corridors of power. This year our sport was chosen once again to provide a conduit for diplomacy, just as it did in the 1970s. I was given a unique opportunity to travel with then Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer and a delegation of business and commercial organisations to China and Japan, where I was able to build connections in both countries which will serve our sport well in the years to come.

Membership has again been a positive story in 2025/26, with overall growth and in particular I am encouraged by increases in women and girls and younger players. That matters because membership is more than a number. It represents people choosing to belong to our table tennis community, to compete, volunteer, support their children, help run clubs and leagues, or simply enjoy being part of the sport.

It also enables us to invest back into the areas that members tell us are important: competitions, safeguarding, rankings and ratings, education of coaches and officials, digital services and support for clubs. I am delighted that we have recently launched TTE Hub, our new membership platform, in partnership with Cloudathlete. This will deliver a faster, more intuitive experience that makes managing your table tennis life easier.

We know that sustainable growth depends on people and among the other key initiatives we will see in 2026/27 is our new Coach Development Framework, which will deliver a better, more engaged coaching workforce. We are also working hard to deliver more opportunities for technical officials and making volunteering more visible and accessible.

There have also been moments of real pride on the performance stage. Our athletes of all ages have again shown what is possible through dedication,

resilience and high-quality support. Success at the top end of the sport inspires the next generation, but it also reminds us how important it is to create clear, well-supported routes from first experiences through to excellence.

I want to thank everyone who gives their time, often quietly and without fanfare, to make sure people are given opportunities to enjoy and progress in the sport. I would also like to thank our Chair Clare Briegal and the Board, National Council and wider committee network, and last but not least my senior leadership team and our staff, who work hard every day to serve the sport and its members.

I would also like to thank our funding partners, Sport England and UK Sport, and our other partners and sponsors.

Looking ahead, our priorities are clear. We must capitalise on the momentum and must make the most of London 2026 as a catalyst to drive the next phase of *Table Tennis United*.

Table tennis in England is at its best when it combines national ambition with local energy. The progress made this year belongs to the whole community, and I am excited about what we can achieve together in the year ahead.

The ITTF World Team Table Tennis Championships Finals London 2026 Presented by ACN was the sport's biggest event in this country in a generation.

The centenary edition of the Championships, back in the city which hosted the first in 1926, saw 64 men's and 64 women's teams qualify.

Over 13 days, at two iconic venues, 240 team matches were played to whittle down the fields to two all-Asian finals between China and Japan. Congratulations to China on successfully defending both Swaythling Cup (men's) and Corbillon Cup (women's) titles.

Including the training centres, four venues were used, along with nine hotels, and more than 2,000 players, coaches and delegates were accredited.

Table Tennis International Events Ltd was the organisation responsible for strategic oversight, planning and delivery management, a special purpose vehicle bringing together Table Tennis England, International Table Tennis Federation (ITTF) and World Table Tennis (WTT).

The Directors are: Clare Briegal MBE, Jonny Cowan, Sandra Deaton, Sally Lockyer, Andrew Nixon, Richard Scruton (chair).

The Event Director was John Timms.

The Championships was supported by 363 volunteers, many of whom were in public-facing roles helping almost 59,000 spectators to enjoy their experience.

Of those spectators, 73% of attendees came from the UK, and 38% had never before attended a live table tennis event.

The atmosphere was electric throughout, notably during England matches and for the final weekend, which was completely sold out. 32% of tickets sold were bought by existing Table Tennis England members.

As well as the sporting spectacle, London also hosted the ITTF summit and centenary dinner, while OVO Arena Wembley welcomed HRH The Duke of Edinburgh and International Olympic Committee President Kirsty Coventry, who 'pushed the button' to formally start play on the day she attended.

The ITTF Museum set up a dedicated display at neighbouring Brent Civic Centre, where the Pride of Table Tennis Awards ceremony was also held – the



guests from the latter also had the opportunity to watch England play.

Among the many meetings and events leading up to the Championships were the draws held at London's tallest building, The Shard, in January 2026.

Britain's Greatest Rally, a publicity event held 50 days before the Championships, set a target of 100,000 rallies being played around the country. That target was smashed, with more than 207,000 rallies played at 33



venues and the initiative being featured on BBC One's flagship *The One Show*.

Working in partnership with the Central London Alliance's London Sports Festival, Table Tennis England installed 10 special edition golden centenary public tables across the capital as free-to-play public tables. These are remaining in London as a permanent legacy of the Championships.



Events 'around the edges' of the Championships included a stakeholder day at the Copper Box Arena, the Corporate Cup Final being staged in the practice hall, a coaching CPD day and an umpires' course and CPD. Fanzones at both venues proved very popular with spectators.





Around 450 external media personnel were accredited across broadcast, photographic, printed and online media from all over the world. A total of 24 broadcasters, including BBC and talkSPORT in the UK, broadcast the

event in a total of 98 countries. This rises to more than 200 countries when the WTT YouTube channel is included.

There was a global reach of 786 million viewers, up to 190m unique viewers, and

617m watched hours (audited markets only). There were more than 205m digital views, excluding WTT YouTube.

BBC Breakfast, R4 Today and 5Live Breakfast all broadcast live from the

first day of the event.

The total direct economic impact of the Championships is assessed at more than £15.25 million.



The social impact legacy of London 2026 extends well beyond the competition itself.

Around 2,000 people attended through our social impact ticketing programme, with approximately 90% of tickets going to under-16s from clubs and schools, helping inspire the next generation of players.

The Championships also featured a vibrant fanzone, attracting an

estimated 7,000 visits through free play opportunities, partner activations and community sessions involving organisations such as Parkinson's UK and the ITTF Foundation.

Strong partnerships were developed with Brent Council, Loughborough University London, Sport England, Parkinson's UK, Activity Alliance and other national and local organisations, creating new opportunities for future collaboration.



More than 40 organisations have benefited from the donation of 85 indoor tables and significant quantities of equipment, ensuring assets remain in communities where they can continue to generate social value.

In addition, 10 Centenary Tables will remain permanently installed across London as a lasting reminder of the Championships, providing free places to play and an ongoing call to action for people to get active.

Loughborough University's social impact research is ongoing and will provide detailed insight into the Championships' legacy, while helping establish robust monitoring and evaluation processes for key programmes including TT Kidz and Ping for Health.

Looking ahead, four Ping for Health pilots, delivered with Parkinson's UK, Activity Alliance and supported by GLL, are set to launch across London.





London 2026 was the first World Championships to come under the umbrella of the ITTF Planet Game Plan 2030, launched to accelerate sustainability across the global table tennis community by embedding environmental, governance and economic sustainability into the fabric of operations.

The goal was clear: to deliver the most sustainable World Championships in the history of the sport, piloting systems – from carbon budgeting to circular procurement – which will define the standard for the next 100 years of the World Championships.

The event's Sustainability Committee set out a bold and ambitious strategic plan

with the following core objectives:

- Minimise environmental impact across seven identified areas: energy, waste management, procurement, catering, travel and transport, supplementary events, biodiversity
- Maximise education
- Measure and monitor
- Report and generate a benchmark for future ITTF events

The strategy focused on three high-impact areas:

Waste & The Circular Economy: London

2026 implemented a rigorous "Zero Waste" pathway, ensuring that materials used, from branding to catering, are reusable, recyclable, or compostable.

Water Stewardship: Accessible hydration stations for fans, athletes and staff significantly reduced the reliance on single use bottled water and minimised wastage throughout the venue.

Travel & Sustainable Transport: "Active Travel" used London's iconic public transport network as the primary means for fans to reach the event. For athletes and officials, low-emission transport fleets bridged the gap between the venue and accommodation.

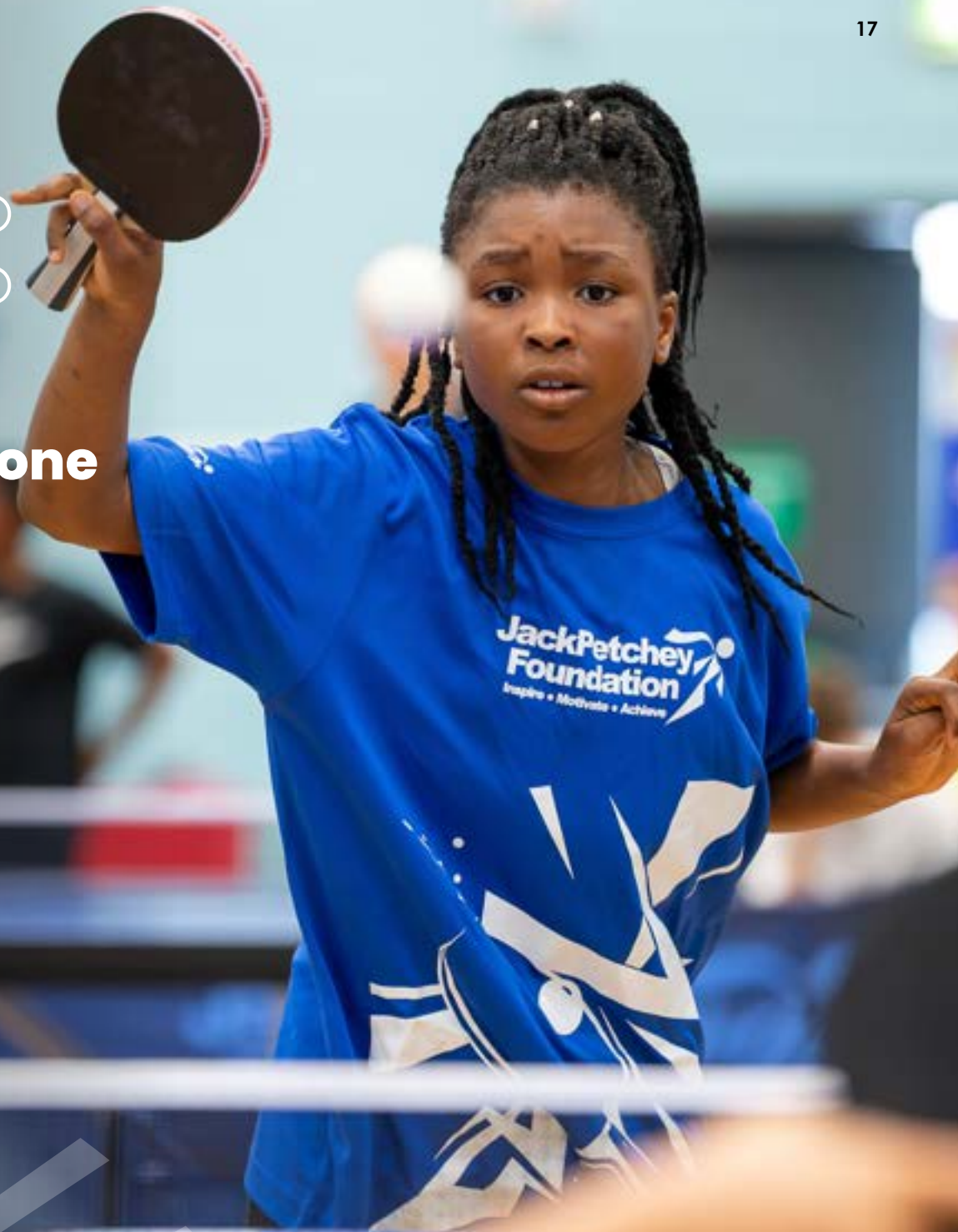


Table Tennis Development

Sport England's Active Lives data shows that approximately 380,000 adults play table tennis regularly, alongside nearly 300,000 children and young people participating each week. This demonstrates the national reach of the sport and the importance of continued investment in grassroots opportunities.

Across our work, we have focused on making programmes more structured, accessible and sustainable, while supporting the people and places that make table tennis thrive.

Growing Participation & Supporting Clubs

Clubs remain at the heart of our sport, and we have continued to support their development and sustainability. In 2025/26, our club network included:

- 173 Premier Clubs
- 284 Associate Clubs
- 703 registered clubs and teams

Together, these clubs engage **20,804** participants across the country, showing the scale and reach of the club network.

Our club network continues to evolve, with more clubs diversifying their offer through social play, recreational sessions and targeted activity for different audiences, helping clubs remain relevant, welcoming and sustainable.

We have also strengthened our place-based approach through our Community Table Tennis Partnerships (CTTPs), supporting local delivery aligned to areas of greatest need. This includes closer collaboration with local authorities, community organisations and delivery partners, helping table tennis reach more people in a wider range of settings.

Children & Young People

Supporting children and young people remains a key priority. We now have 1,413 Under 11 members within the Table Tennis England community, providing a strong foundation for future participation and progression.

TT Kidz was redeveloped in 2025/2026, with rollout planned for September 2026, our aim is to make TT Kidz a cornerstone of early engagement, introducing young people to table tennis in a fun, structured and accessible way.

Alongside this, the **Jack Petchey Foundation Table Tennis Programme** continues to be one of our strongest youth partnerships, supporting young people across London and Essex. In 2025/26, the partnership entered its **15th year** and began a new **2025 to 27 two-year plan**,



designed to expand access and embed table tennis more sustainably in schools and youth organisations. The first year of the new plan focuses on expanding the **Table Donation Scheme** and strengthening the London and Essex Schools Competition pathway.

Early demand has been strong, with **111 organisations** applying for indoor tables and requests totalling **362 indoor tables**. By the June programme update, **200 indoor tables** had been allocated, with **189 passed to suppliers for delivery**, alongside **50 outdoor tables** allocated, of which **41 had been passed to suppliers**.

The **2025/26 academic year** also saw the Jack Petchey competition pathway continue to build momentum, with all six team qualifiers and all six individual qualifiers completed. The academic year culminated shortly after



the financial year-end with the Jack Petchey Schools' Table Tennis Individual Finals, bringing together **160 young people** from **53 schools** at the University of East London's SportDock.

This work supports our wider aim of giving more young people positive first experiences of table tennis, particularly in areas of greatest need, inclusive settings and organisations actively promoting girls' participation. Active Lives data reinforces this opportunity, showing nearly **300,000 children and young people** playing table tennis each week, highlighting strong demand and the need to continue widening access, especially for under-represented groups.



Health, Inclusion & Community Impact

This year has continued to show the power of table tennis to support health, wellbeing and social connection.

Through the development of **Ping**, we are reaching new audiences and creating accessible community opportunities to play. **Ping Hubs** are proving particularly effective in engaging people who may not traditionally connect with clubs. The Ping Hub model is delivering strong community impact, with standout examples in Ilford and Manchester.



These hubs have created vibrant, inclusive spaces for people of all ages and backgrounds to take part, often in high-footfall community environments. Both locations have received external recognition and featured across media and sector publications, helping raise the profile of table tennis as an accessible, social and inclusive sport. They provide a clear blueprint for scaling community-based activity nationally and bringing table tennis to more people, in more places.

Alongside this, our **Ping for Health** pilot is underway with key partners including **Parkinson's UK, Activity Alliance and the ITTF Foundation**, supporting people with long-term health conditions to benefit from regular physical activity and social engagement.

We are also encouraged that **14.7% of our members come from the top 30% most deprived areas**, reflecting progress in reaching communities where sport can have the greatest impact.

Building a Stronger Workforce

Our workforce remains one of the sport's greatest strengths. In 2025/26 it included:

- 4,067 volunteers
- 3,581 coaches, including 746 licensed coaches
- 551 umpires
- 304 tournament organisers
- 69 referees

These individuals play a critical role in delivering activity across clubs, competitions and community settings. We thank them for their dedication, time and contribution.

Volunteer recognition was also a major theme through the **2025/26 Cloudathlete Pride of Table Tennis Awards**, which celebrate the volunteers, officials, coaches, clubs, leagues, schools and partners who make an outstanding contribution to the sport. You can read more about the 2025/26 awards elsewhere in this report.

We have also made important progress in preparing the Officials Academy, which will strengthen the technical workforce and support the long-term sustainability of the sport.

Preparing for the World Championships

A significant focus of the year was preparing for the ITTF World Team Table Tennis Championships Finals London 2026, which has acted as a catalyst for development activity.

Our priority has been to ensure programmes such as **Ping, TT Kidz and Ping for Health** are ready to scale, so we can maximise the impact of the Championships for clubs, communities and participants.

A key development has been strengthening our partnership with **Loughborough University**, who are helping design and deliver a robust social impact evaluation of the Championships. This includes developing an evaluation framework, collecting data and analysing the impact of our programmes. This partnership means we are not only delivering activity, but building a stronger evidence base to understand how table tennis contributes to physical activity, mental wellbeing and social connection. It also positions Table Tennis England to use major events as a catalyst for long-term social impact.



Challenges and Learning

While progress has been positive, there remain areas where we continue to learn and improve.

- Despite growth, gender imbalance remains a challenge, with significantly fewer women and girls participating in the sport.
- School engagement, while improving, will require sustained focus in 2026/27 as TT Kidz is rolled out to a wider audience.
- Membership retention and progression across the pathway remain areas where we continue to refine our approach.

These insights are shaping future priorities and helping us focus where we can have the greatest impact.

Looking Ahead

Looking ahead, we will build on this year's progress and ensure we are ready to maximise the opportunities presented by the World Championships and beyond.

Our priorities include:

- Further growing and supporting clubs as the foundation of the sport
- Expanding TT Kidz and school engagement to strengthen the youth pathway
- Scaling Ping Hubs and Ping for Health to reach new and more diverse audiences
- Developing a stronger digital engagement layer for people who currently play table tennis but do not yet engage with Table Tennis England
- Continuing to develop the workforce, including the launch of the Officials Academy
- Strengthening partnerships and evidence-based practice, including our work with Loughborough University

We remain committed to making table tennis a sport for everyone, ensuring more people can experience the benefits of playing, competing and being part of our community.

Competitions & Events

British Clubs Leagues

It was another record-breaking year for British Clubs League – TTE’s premier club league format - with the highest-ever overall entries, and the Cadet and Junior sections continuing to bed-in under the BCL umbrella.

Notable successes include:

- Senior BCL expanding into a 6th tier (Tier D) for the first time, with a year-on-year increase of 18 teams (14%)
- A new initiative to utilise the Sundays following the single-day round of Senior BCL fixtures for 1*/ 2* singles tournaments at the same venues resulted in 6 new events welcoming 247 locals and BCL players
- The Senior BCL Premier Division evolved to a national weekend format, expanding to 8 teams ... 100% of teams feel that all teams playing together in one venue is beneficial or very beneficial
- In order to create more opportunities for girls to start playing at an entry level, a new 3-date Girls' Cadet series was piloted, comprising 44 teams and 120+ players. Over 45% of participants were completely new to Cadet or Junior BCL, meaning that we are successfully engaging significant numbers of new and developing players in regulated competition via this new event

Overall, over 4,000 players competed in more than 50,000 head-to-head matches in British Clubs League.



County Championships

The County Championship representative format has continued to be a key part of the national league programme, also including dedicated age-groups for Cadet and O60s teams. The number of teams trended down slightly, with a rise in the Cadet cohort:

Notable developments this season included:

- Consolidation of the Senior Premier programme into a single weekend
- Launch of a revised 'pooled expenses' framework for participating counties
- Development of online entry/ payment for Season '26/27 to now align all National Leagues in terms of process and support via TT Leagues

A decision was made by Competitions Committee in August 2025 to integrate the previous standalone Qualification event as part of the Championships event – making it a larger, more complex and demanding single event to deliver. The rationale and key objectives were to enhance the atmosphere and experience for players and spectators, and to boost spectator numbers.

The change meant the event grew with more than double the matches, and a 270% increase in competing players.

It was identified and accepted that this approach would, at least in the short-term, lead to a reduction in qualifying entrants and a likely shift away from key youth demographics, due to taking place on a school/ work day. It is also evident that this approach has negatively and disproportionately affected the numbers of women and girls taking part.

There were naturally a number of learning opportunities from the first iteration of the new format, but feedback evidenced that the integrated approach was preferred overall by spectators and by players, with spectators and players both advising the new format improved their experience and the event atmosphere.

Whilst the change to an integrated qualifier did not also result in the expected boost in spectator numbers, which were negatively affected by external factors including a delayed ticket sales launch and the proximity of the World Championships - it has given a solid platform for future growth and success.

National Series

Following its inaugural season, the National Series consolidated a place in the national calendar and in the player pathway with a new change to divisions of 8 players.

The series took place over three national rounds, providing a regular high-quality competitive opportunity for the top 16-24-32 boys and girls players from the U13, U15 and U19 age-groups in the Home Countries, with promotion and relegation taking place between tiers in each age/gender category following each round.

Feedback from players, parents and coaches indicated strong and consistent feedback across all age-groups on the value of the event format and event experience (all 4+ out of 5)

Our sincere thanks to the hosts of the Series - Nottingham TTC and Grantham College.





Pathway Development Cup

The five-year National Competition Review project concluded this season with the launch of the final piece of the jigsaw – the Pathway Development Cup.

This provides a team competition opportunity for U11 and U13 boys and girls who are currently part of the Table Tennis England network of Pathway Development Centres (PDCs) around the country.

This event provides a targeted team competition opportunity for our youngest cohort of performance players, at an area level where critical mass does not exist at club or county level. It also acts as a springboard to British Clubs Leagues (eg Cadet BCL).

The inaugural event took place at Highfield TTC, Wellingborough, with the North West taking both the U13 boys and girls titles, and the South East taking both the boys and girls honours at U11s.

Tiered Open Tournaments

The evolution of the 1*/2*/4* structure in August 2025, in order to make these events easier and more cost-effective to run for hosts and to enter by participants, has helped underpin growth in the number of regulated events, and also ensure that the tiered formats deliver more effectively as a pathway.

The changes were supported by an expanded and enhanced 'Tournaments Explained' supporting document, which was developed as a one-stop resource for both new and existing tournament organisers [here](#) – as well as an interactive player pathway model for players/ parents/ clubs/ coaches to map each age-category and standard of play to the appropriate TTE competitions [here](#).

As an illustration, Senior 4* and satellite events have seen welcome growth from five in season 25/26 to nine on the calendar for 26/27 – a Senior 4* case study can be seen [here](#) in order to share an overview and insights to help other Tournament Organisers to achieve success.

Talent pathway

Pathway Development Centres (PDCs)

A wide range of PDC camps were delivered throughout the year, including Ones to Watch camps, Girls Only camps and the inaugural PDC Cup, providing players with additional development and competitive opportunities.

Through the camps, there has been a greater collaboration with PDC coaches, strengthening player support and improving the identification of emerging talent, creating clearer progression opportunities into the England Hopes programme.



Talent & Performance Team

Dedicated age-category coaches were introduced to provide greater consistency and support across the talent pathway.

Coaches work closely with players throughout focused age group training camps, and wider Great Britain Training Squad (GBTS) camps. This approach increased coach contact time with players, strengthened coach-athlete relationships and enabled more individualised support, improving continuity across training and competition while supporting long-term player development.

Liam Pitchford is now fully back in action after almost a year of inactivity due to hip surgery. Liam has his sights firmly set on delivering his best performance ever at LA2028 Olympic Games which, if he qualifies, will be his fifth Olympic Games.



England Hopes & World Hopes Week

The England Hopes programme continued to provide high-quality development opportunities for the country's most promising young players. September saw the Talent team deliver the first ever England Hopes week – training opportunities throughout the week which culminated in a play-off for a spot at the ITTF World Hopes week for one girl and one boy.

The England Talent Team planned and delivered the ITTF World Hopes Week in Sheffield. This event brought together the world's leading Under-12 players and coaches in a high-performance environment. The programme forms an important part of the international talent pathway, providing valuable training, competition and learning experiences that prepare young athletes for future performance opportunities. The week saw 40 players and their coaches come together to take part in a week of training followed by a 2-day competition. The success of this event was recognised by Mikael Andersson, Director of Sport ITTF saying "The feedback from our participants last year was overwhelmingly positive, with many praising the activity as the best organised, they have ever attended. Last year's World Hopes raised the bar for future organisers, and we are very excited to be returning to Sheffield for another great week of identifying our future talents and developing table tennis globally."



Diploma in Sporting Excellence (DiSE)

Dedicated age-category coaches were introduced to provide greater consistency and support across the talent pathway.

The DiSE programme continued to grow, achieving a 100% pass rate across the cohort, reflecting the commitment of both athletes and staff. The programme also delivered a successful international trip to Linz, where players returned with a number of medals, gaining valuable international competition experience. The programme secured an increase in DiSE places for the 2026–2028 cohort.



Coach Development

This year marked a significant step forward in coach development with the introduction of a new Coach Development Team, providing greater support to coaches across the pathway.

Key achievements included:

- Launch of the brand new Coach Development Pathway, providing clearer progression opportunities for coaches.
- A new partnership with CIMSPA, with one coaching qualification now recognised as a professional qualification.
- Introduction of the Coach Development Framework, creating a structured and progressive approach to coach learning and development.
- Together, these developments have strengthened the coaching workforce and enhanced the support available to players throughout the talent pathway.

TT Leagues

TT Leagues continues to be an essential part of the Table Tennis England competitions infrastructure. It is used by more than 150 local leagues for managing their league competitions and also for national competitions. These include British Clubs Leagues, Cadet/Junior BCL, County Championships and National Schools competitions.

The run-in to the 2025/26 season proved to be a busy one with 14 new users from local leagues. In most cases, the leagues were able to set up their competition themselves with minimal help from the TTE Help Desk. In one case, a local league was able to get its 2025/26 competition up and running within two weeks – just in time for the start of the new season in that league.

The new users have provided positive feedback about the system and have welcomed the reassurance that help is only an email away. The ability to run Divisional Cup Competitions and Handicap Competitions on their league websites has been welcomed by many of the new users. The local league ranking system has also been popular.



For the County Championships, the online entry functionality of TT Leagues has been used in April/May for the team entry process for the 2026/27 season. This worked well and because the data from the entries could be downloaded into a spreadsheet, the process of producing the first draft of the Divisional structure was both simpler and quicker. The online system has also streamlined the production of the information that will go into the Handbook. Nonetheless, there are aspects of the online entry system that should be more closely attuned to the requirements of the County Championships. We will aim to make those changes for the entries for the 2027/28 season.

TT Leagues was first used for the finals of the Schools team competitions in 2024/25. Building on this success, the system was used in 2025/26 for the London Area finals. This tested the flexibility of the system in dealing with the two-phase approach adopted for the Area Finals, namely an initial group phase followed by a knockout phase for the winners and runners-up. This added complexity to the competition, but the TT Leagues system worked well in dealing with this two-phase approach. A further test was provided at the National Team Finals where a new “play-for-place” format was introduced. But the flexibility and robustness of the TT Leagues system was again demonstrated and the system worked well.



For the 2026/27 season, Table Tennis England will be using a new membership management system – TTE Hub. TT Leagues will access the membership data via an API using a similar process to that currently used. However, it is hoped that over time, TT Leagues will be able to be more closely integrated into TTE Hub. One obvious area to explore is the automatic generation of custom email groups directed at specific cohorts, such as cadets, juniors and veterans. But of course our first priority in the run-up to the start of the 2026/27 season was to ensure a seamless transition to the new system.

Looking ahead beyond 2026/27, there are still opportunities for further growth. Artificial Intelligence provides a powerful tool for developing the system. We have already done some initial work to explore how AI can provide much greater flexibility for fixture generation. The ETTA/TTE fixture grids that have been used for 50 years or more to generate fixtures have been an essential part of local league operations. But they lack flexibility, particularly in relation to generating fixture lists for divisions with different numbers of teams. Initial explorations of the use of AI for fixture generation have been encouraging. AI may provide the flexibility that local leagues are asking for in respect of fixture generation.

Much has been achieved with TT Leagues since it was launched in July 2019. But we continue to explore the development of the system to meet the needs of the Table Tennis England competitive landscape.

Digital Transformation and a New Home for Members

This year marked a cornerstone in our digital strategy.

We have been working behind the scenes to build and prepare our new digital membership experience, powered by Cloudathlete, launching in July 2026 ahead of the 26/27 season.

Members can look forward to a much more engaging community experience, driven by a more dynamic ranking and ratings engine. With greater customisation and personalisation, this infrastructure ensures a robust, connected, and user-friendly digital ecosystem for our entire community. Furthermore, what members experience from the start of the 26/27 season only scratches the surface of the platform's long-term capabilities.

Crucially, our digital engagement has continued to grow across all touchpoints this year - including our social media channels, websites, and our total contactable audience - providing a strong, highly engaged foundation for this new platform and a much greater reach into audiences who are at the start of their journey within the sport, driving our membership growth and recruitment into key roles across the community from coaches, officials, event organisers, welfare officers and more.



Staging Fantastic Events: The Road to the Worlds

WTT Star Contender London

In October 2025, we took the next step on our journey to making England a home to world-class, international table tennis events.

Building on the success of the two WTT Feeder Manchester events, the WTT Star Contender represented a significant stepping stone towards the World Championships. With over 4,000 tickets sold - including a sold-out finals day at the Copper Box Arena - the event successfully expanded our audience.

Just over 40% of spectators had never had the opportunity to attend a table tennis event of this level before, and 97% stated they would want to do so again.



Road to the Worlds

The momentum continued to build into the new year. A key milestone on the journey to the centenary event was hosting the official draw live from the Shangri-La Hotel at The Shard, hosting the draw in such an iconic location perfectly set the stage for a historic tournament.



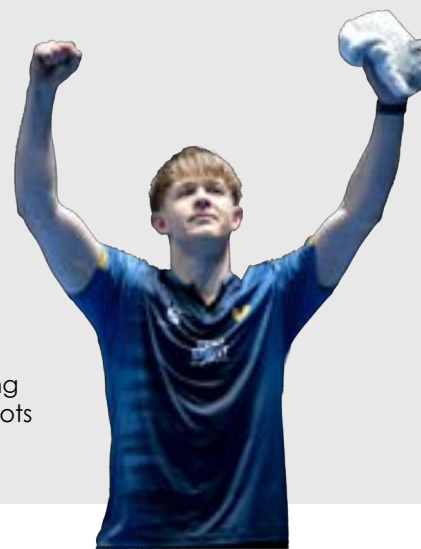
Driven by the momentum of the home World Championships, and with the sport experiencing a Hollywood spotlight through the film *Marty Supreme* in early January 2026, our media engagement took off significantly. A centrepiece of this build-up was the Centenary Table Programme, which saw 10 striking, special-edition golden tables installed at high-profile, iconic London landmarks. This initiative provided highly visible, engaging touchpoints across the capital, generating a vibrant dialogue between the public and the sport.

This visibility was supercharged by Britain's Greatest Rally, designed as a major grassroots legacy initiative on the road to the Worlds. Held on 9 March to mark 50 days to go until the Championships, 33 officially registered clubs, schools and community groups worked together with the ambitious goal of achieving 100,000 rallies in a single day. The community response was phenomenal, more than doubling the target to record a massive 207,343 rallies.



Our athletes also benefited from more exposure and profiling. With numerous interviews featured across news publications, including the BBC, ITV, Sky News, talkSPORT, The Telegraph and many more.

In total we reached a staggering total global audience of over 1.8 billion (representing the combined publication-wide audience figures for all outlets featuring coverage) providing our athletes with vital exposure whilst simultaneously building visibility at the grassroots level.



The World Championships themselves were a monumental success for live audience engagement. Across the event, we issued a total of over 58,000 tickets. This figure proudly includes our extensive complimentary and community programme allocations, ensuring the event remained accessible to a wide demographic.

Crucially, the tournament succeeded in reaching new fans: 38% of attendees had never been to a live table tennis event before, whilst 73% of attendees were based in the UK, highlighting the strong domestic appetite for world-class table tennis.

To further commemorate the centenary homecoming, we launched an exclusive London 2026 and ITTF centenary merchandise range. Available both online and in-venue, the collection offered fans a tangible connection to the historic event. The range successfully drove commercial engagement and brand visibility, featuring everything from limited-edition commemorative jackets to the hugely popular plush toy of our official event mascot, Ping!





Developing our Partners

Corporate Community & Government Engagement

Community connection extended to new strategic partnerships this year. In February 2026, we hosted the successful “Round the Table” launch event at Google HQ in London. This expanded our network into the corporate sector, bringing new audiences and stakeholders into the Table Tennis England community to support the sport’s long-term growth.

This initiative culminated in the Corporate Cup, with the finalists competing in a spectacular final at the OVO Arena Wembley alongside the World Championships.

The World Championships also served as a powerful vehicle for soft power. The scale and prestige of the centenary event gave us an unparalleled platform to drive deeper engagement with our government stakeholders, positioning table tennis as a key contributor to the national sporting and cultural landscape.

A prime example of this was Table Tennis England Chief Executive Sally Lockyer joining Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer on an official Government trade delegation to China and Japan. This trip not only deepened our connection with the UK government but also opened crucial doors to key stakeholders in Asia. During this visit in Beijing, we signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with China Media Group (CMG) - the world’s largest media conglomerate - building on our global reach to create new opportunities for participation and engagement.

UK Anti Doping

As part of our performance programme we are required to undertake anti-doping training, education and awareness. We have to develop and deliver an implementation plan and development plan annually and show evidence of delivery.

We are required to undertake and provide evidence of our ongoing compliance to the UK Anti-Doping (UKAD) Framework, and this was completed in April 2026.

Joanna Keay-Blyth, Director of Operations, is the Anti-Doping Lead and Evie Collier, Coach Learning and Development Manager, is our trainer and delivers all the training requirements.

At the time of writing we are halfway through the education with parents from both Great Britain Training Squad (GBTS) and England Hopes squads. There has been positive attendance and engagement from parents and Evie has also been observed by UKAD for one of the sessions.

Players within GBTS and DiSE squads have completed the Compete Clean online learning, which is valid for two years.

Coaches in the performance team have completed the Coach Clean module, which is also valid for two years. Senior Athletes were due to complete the Compete Clean learning in June 2026 when their education is required to be validated.

Evie Collier is sitting on a focus group for the UKAD project manager group and will also attend a UKAD QA day in Loughborough. Don Parker as Board lead attended the Board Anti-Doping Lead Forum on the 18 November 2025.

Plans will start in Q3 for delivery for next season and education.



Safeguarding

We continue to review our SafeTT policies, procedures and guidelines to ensure they remain current and reflect legislative changes and sector developments.

The SafeTT Policy was reviewed in March 2026 with amendments made to refresh the content and strengthen key areas, including updated guidance on positions of trust following changes to legislation and updates to key areas such as the Government's Prevent programme. Alongside our policy work, we have continued to develop our safeguarding web presence to ensure that key information is clearly presented and easy to navigate for all members, whether a player, parent, coach or volunteer.

During the course of the year, we managed six new safeguarding cases with four disciplinary cases involving breaches of the Disciplinary Regulations and SafeTT Code of Conduct. A number of these involved the application of interim suspensions pending the outcome of proceedings or internal investigation, and in four cases resulted in permanent suspensions being applied. Two appeal hearings also took place during the reporting period.

In addition to formal cases, we introduced a structured lower-level concerns log to capture concerns falling below the threshold for formal disciplinary or safeguarding referral. By March 2026, the log recorded seven entries. The themes identified included member disputes and relationship breakdowns requiring welfare input, Code of Conduct matters and safeguarding advice queries from clubs. A positive trend across the year is that several concerns were identified and escalated directly by Club Welfare Officers, consistent with TTE's safeguarding structure operating as intended at club level.

In November 2025, we held an online Welfare Officer training session attended by volunteers from across the country and followed up with a post-event feedback survey to gain valuable insights which will help inform our delivery of future training events.

At the Mark Bates Senior National Championships in Nottingham in March 2026, TTE Designated Safeguarding Lead Kyhl Daly conducted a safeguarding survey, receiving 32 responses from players, officials, volunteers, parents and spectators. The survey established a valuable baseline on participants' experience of safety, visibility of safeguarding information and confidence in reporting. The findings and recommendations from the survey will be used to improve safeguarding provision at future events.

DBS-related queries accounted for a significant volume of member contact during the year, with many coaches and volunteers seeking guidance on how to navigate the application process. In response, we published a new step-by-step guide to completing a DBS application through our provider First Advantage (Know Your People), which is now available on the TTE website and has helped to reduce the volume of direct queries to the team. We are also monitoring developments in digital DBS verification, which a number of other NGBs are beginning to adopt, with a view to simplifying the process further in the coming year.



During 2025/26, the Safeguarding team developed a comprehensive Staff and Volunteer Safeguarding Communications and Training Plan for 2026/27 which is intended to support our approach to member engagement. The plan sets out a structured programme of safeguarding communications including blogs, e-newsletters and social media activity alongside a calendar of training and webinar activity for Club Welfare Officers, coaches, chaperones and TTE staff. It is designed to ensure consistent, year-round safeguarding awareness across the whole of the TTE community.

Female chaperones continued to play an important role in supporting our performance squads, accompanying pathway players to training camps and events, including chaperone attendance at the recent 2026 ITTF World Team Table Tennis Championships Finals in London.

The NSPCC Sport unit (previously CPSU) carried out their annual assessment review in May 2025 and we followed this in taking actions in response to any areas identified as requiring improvement including the introduction of the structured lower-level concerns log referenced above, in January 2026.

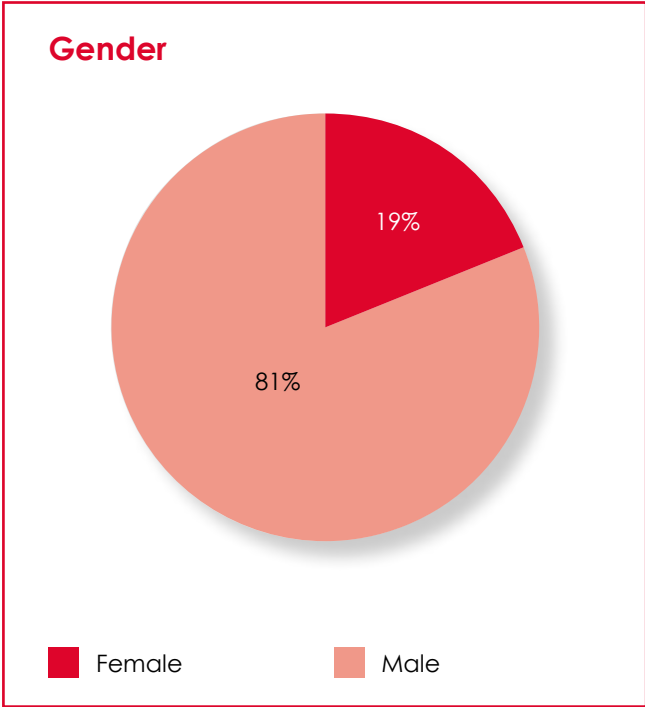
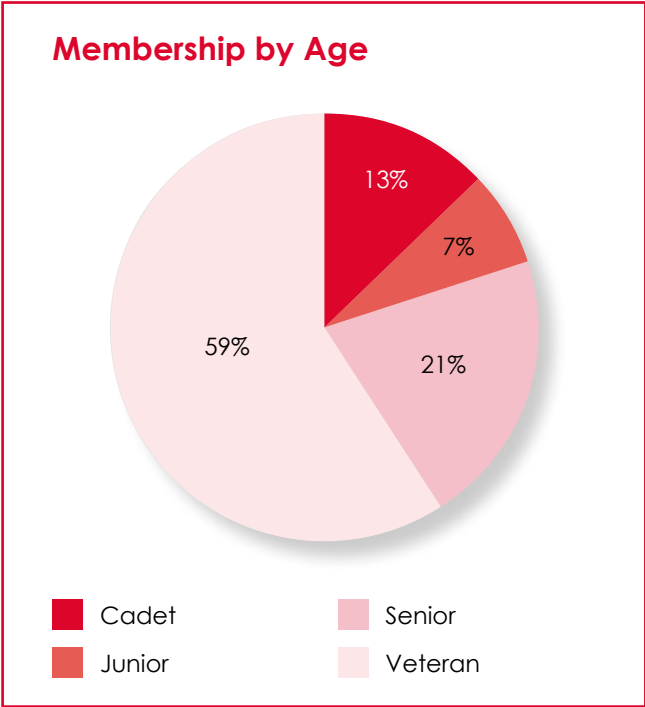
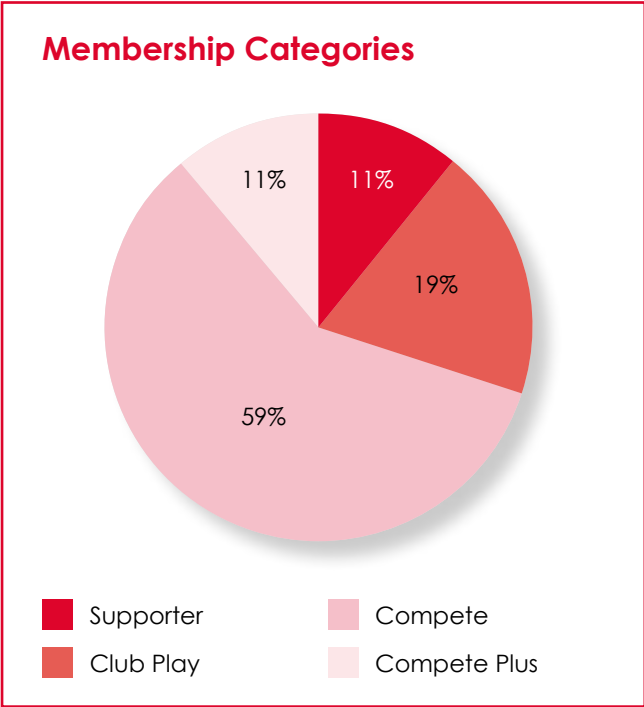
Sport England's Sport Welfare Officers, linked to Active Partnerships across England, continue to provide networking and training support to our club welfare officers. TTE has maintained an active relationship with this network throughout the year, and discussions are still ongoing for one of our clubs to be selected to take part in an exclusive trial of the Welfare 360 digital safeguarding tool.

Membership & Customer Service

Membership numbers as of 31 March 2026 were up by 4,946 (16.9%) compared with the previous season. Growth was recorded across all membership types and every age group, as detailed in the tables below.

Overall, the figures show that table tennis continues to attract and retain members across all age groups, providing a solid platform for future growth.

The Support team remained the largest ticket group, managing 5,693 tickets, an increase of 1% compared with the previous season. Although the percentage increase was small, the volume of tickets remained high. A good amount of these enquiries related to the ITTF World Team Table Tennis Championships Finals, which generated increased demand for customer support throughout the beginning of this year.

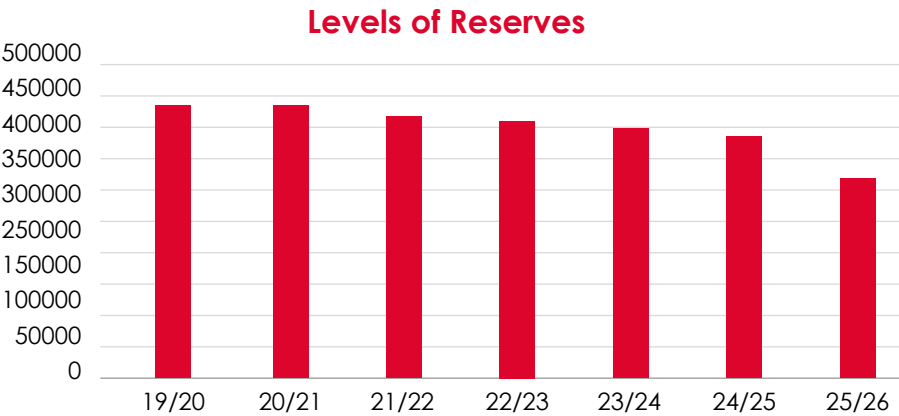
A new Governance ticket group was introduced during 2025/26, generating 29 tickets. As this category was not available in the previous season, direct year-on-year comparisons are not possible; however, its introduction provides greater visibility and reporting capability for governance-related enquiries moving forward.

Work has been carried out by all staff and Board at a workshop in June 2025, followed by multiple working group sessions over the past 12 months, to define a set of Table Tennis England values which outline who we want to be, how we want to work and how we will be successful. We plan to share more on our values with our members during the 2026/27 season.

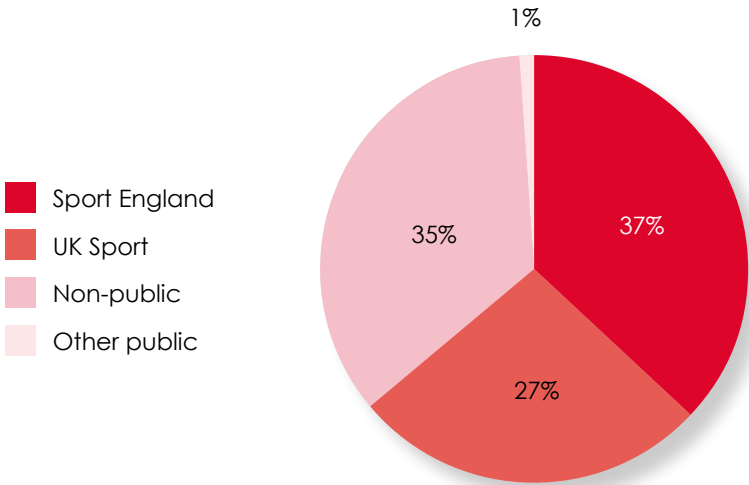

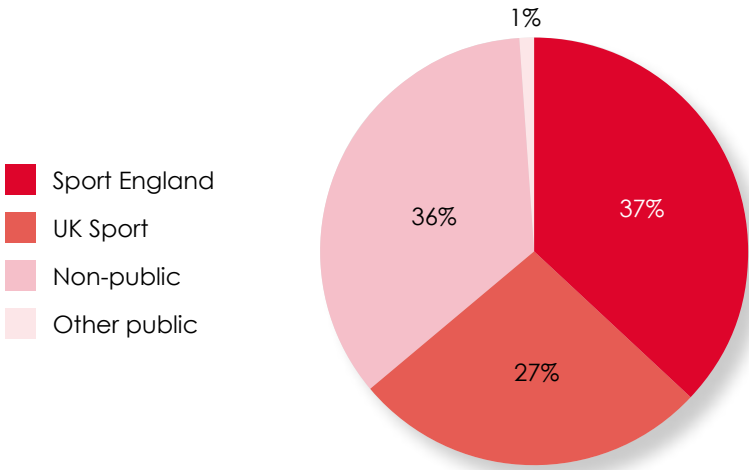

Financial Statement

This is the fourth year of the 2022/27 Sport England funding cycle, in which we received a partner award of £2,008,631. A reduction of £66,369 compared to the previous year. Sport England funding continues to be ring-fenced with clear outcomes and outputs required to maintain investment of public funds.

While the last few years have been challenging with rising living costs and inflation, we always work hard to try and achieve a near balanced year-end position, although due to reduced commercial income, increased legal and governance costs and a provision for doubtful debt, we finished the year with a deficit.

Over the last few years, we have consistently incurred small deficits, but we are looking to reverse this trend, although with a large proportion of our income coming from ring-fenced funding, we are limited as to how quickly we can grow our reserves level.

Membership numbers have gradually increased since the pandemic, although we haven't fully recovered to pre-Covid levels.

Table Tennis England, on behalf of Great British Table Tennis, once again received a Progression grant from UK Sport to support the development of the GB performance system; a crucial investment that

underpins our ambitions for future Olympic medal success.

We also received a small amount of Commonwealth Games funding to support LA2028 qualification prospects and maintain a pipeline of English athletes ready for the India 2030 games.

The British Para Table Tennis World-Class Performance programme is accounted for within our financial statements, although income is equal to expenditure and any unspent grant is recorded under deferred income. Due to funding conditions, British Para Table Tennis transitioned away from the organisation at the end of the financial year, which will reduce the income and expenditure in next year's financial statements.

We were once again grateful to other partners; the Jack Petchey Foundation for their support of the children and young people programme in London and Essex, to Mark Bates Ltd for their commitment to the Senior National Championships and Greater London Authority for the Mayor of London Sports Internship Programme to support two fixed term posts during the year.

We continue to monitor any potential financial risks and identify new opportunities that could help mitigate those risks. A copy of our audited accounts are available on our website.

Governance Statement

English Table Tennis Association is a limited company which trades as Table Tennis England. It is the National Governing Body for the sport in England and is affiliated to the International Table Tennis Federation. It publishes its Articles and other governance information on its website. It receives public funding and, in return, is required to comply with the Code for Sports Governance.

The Board is the ultimate decision-making body and exercises the powers of the organisation. The Board is responsible for: setting the strategy of the organisation; approving the long-term financial plan and annual budget; monitoring delivery of the operational plan, priorities

and objectives; periodic review of the financial plan and performance against annual budget, and periodic review of major risks and programmes.

Day-to-day management of Table Tennis England is delegated by the Board to the Senior Leadership Team under the leadership of the Chief Executive. Financial authorities are in place for each level of the Executive structure.

We define our vision and purpose in our strategy, *Table Tennis United*, which we publish on our website. We monitor progress against the strategy at each Board meeting and publish a detailed report on the progress towards each pledge in the annual review.



We continue with our governance journey to ensure we are a High Performing Governing Body and this year we saw Judy Rogers, Safeguarding and Disciplinary Manager retire after 28 years' service to the organisation. We continue to invest in this essential area by recruiting a full-time replacement to ensure good governance and integrity are supported.

Regarding our Board members, Sally Lockyer has been Chief Executive since December 2024 and Clare Briegal Chair since 31 March 2025. Paul Bishop, who was co-opted in February 2025, was appointed on a permanent basis in June 2025 as Director and Chair of the Finance and Audit Committee. Leanne O'Leary was appointed in August 2025 and replaces Kwadjo Adjepong as Chair of Risk and Governance Committee.

Kwadjo and Ray James (Chair of the Development Committee) stood down at the end of their first terms in June 2025. Ritchie Venner's first term also came to an end and he was re-elected for a second term in May 2025. One appointed director position was replaced by an Elected Director position in accordance with the change in Articles approved at the 2024 AGM, this position was taken by Liam McTiernan in May 2025.

There were four scheduled Board meetings held during the year and the Board member attendance is tabled below. There were also two interim virtual Board meetings held during the period. Minutes of the Board meetings, some with appropriate redactions, are available on the TTE website.

In addition, every Board member sat on a committee, which met between the scheduled Board meetings.

Committee Chair Executive Summary

Over the past 12 months the Finance Committee has reviewed and approved the annual Financial Statements as well as quarterly Finance Reports, including receiving the report of the external auditors which raised no significant reporting or controls issues.

The committee also reviewed and approved an interim and a final budget for the year to 31 March 2026.

The main focus of the committee though has been to get to grips with the financial position of the company, and in particular the level of reserves and the sustainability of our revenues and expenses.

Reserves at 1 April 2025 were approximately £350,000 against a minimum requirement as calculated by Finance of £220,000. Reserves have been going down steadily over the past 10 years with most years resulting in a small deficit – this was around £12,000 in each of the last 2 years. The committee felt that the company should have a larger buffer to absorb any shocks and provide the capacity for investment. As a first step the committee recommended to the Board, and the Board agreed, that the company has no appetite for deficits and that all budgets should show a surplus as a minimum.

With leadership now in place and major event pressures reducing, the committee is well positioned to:

- Rebuild its membership and structure
- Provide more consistent and strategic oversight
- Play a stronger role in shaping development priorities and future investment

Overall, while the committee has not operated at full capacity this year, it has successfully reset its direction and is positioned to make a **more meaningful contribution in 2026/27**.

Committee Chair Executive Summary

The Competition programme generally went smoothly, including the inaugural U11 & U13 Pathway Development Cup and a successful pilot for a new Girls' Cadet British Clubs League format.

Continuing growth in British Clubs Leagues saw the largest ever entry, and changes to the format of the Premier Division in Senior BCL were well received by a majority of the clubs. The Senior National Championships transitioned to a new format which, as anticipated, was not without challenges. Constructive feedback has been taken from all stakeholders and will be built into the continued evolution of the event.

A 'Task and Finish' group has been established to consider the pathway of Cadet and Junior girls' table tennis, from new players to performance, and this will be ongoing during next season.

Committee Chair Executive Summary

It has been a successful year for the Talent and Performance Committee. The performance of the England players in the various age groups is improving. There is still work to be done but we are definitely moving in the right direction.

Our T & P meetings have been well supported. They demonstrate how our volunteer members, members of the TTE Board and the TTE Performance team can discuss issues in detail and then take recommendations to the Board for approval.

Enormous thanks to the committee members who bring with them great knowledge, including playing at the highest level, domestic and international competition and training structures, vital support areas, finance, coaching etc.

Key Decisions/ Recommendations to the Board

May 25

- Draft paper was sent to Board outlining the significant cost of international competitions for our players and a key message was for Board to support further investment in to Talent Development
- The committee discussed the importance of the Talent team working closer with the Development team to ensure structured talent development happens in clubs and at a younger age

September 26

- Talent team to integrate the Player Development Framework into the clubs through our coach development strategy
- Committee was presented with the new coaching education system, transitioning from Moodle to a new LMS
- Committee fed into the Competitions Committee chair on feedback on domestic competitions and how to maximise the benefits for English players

January 26

- Committee have asked Board to consider a hardship fund for players who simply cannot afford the cost of playing table tennis as this presents a real risk to talent development
- Committee to meet post Worlds to review Nationals feedback and plan improvements
- Committee to update Terms of Reference to include coach development oversight
- Board were presented and approved the new coach membership structure

Future Plan and Key Priorities for year ahead

- Launch and implement new coach development framework and qualifications
- Ensure we have a world-class full-time offer for our athletes at the Elite Training Centre
- Maintain a close working relationship with Competitions Tier 1 Committee
- Embed the Coach Mentors across the country and drive player development alongside at a younger age to ensure we optimise national squads and continue to raise the bar
- Seek ways to invest more into our athletes through a hardship fund and further investment
- Deliver World Hopes Week and ensure our relationship with ITTF continues to flourish, enabling greater outcomes for our talented players
- Ensure we maximise our potential to qualify and put in our best performance at LA2028 Olympic Games

National Council

National Council continues to be a vital source of advice to Table Tennis England on a wide range of issues. This includes governance, coaching, performance, competitions and development. The close connection of National Councillors to table tennis in clubs, leagues and counties is at the core of the advice that National Council provides.

Our Select Committees on the Constitution, Competition and Disability bring together specialist expertise which greatly assists National Council in providing advice to the TTE Board on all aspects of these subjects. For example, the Competitions Select Committee has made suggestions on improvements that could be made to the National Championships and how the competitive opportunities for young female players can be enhanced.

Four meetings were held in the 2025/26 season. These were all online meetings which makes it easier to ensure a wide representation from counties. The meetings have been well-attended with between 35 and 40 participants at each meeting. Most counties have been represented at most meetings.

Building Autonomy

We have continued the process of National Council being more autonomous and responsible for managing its own affairs. The National Council website is a key tool for the management of meetings. We now allow National Councillors to invite a guest from their county to attend National Council meetings. Typically, this is the Deputy National Councillor, but the National Councillor can invite anyone from their county who they think will benefit from attending and will be able to contribute to the meeting. This approach also helps with succession planning for National Councillors within their counties.

World Championships

Not surprisingly, the World Championships featured on the agenda of all four of our meetings. We were delighted to have the presence of Richard Scruton (Chair, Table Tennis International Events) at both the September and January meetings. Richard was able to keep us informed of the evolving plans and arrangements for the Championships which helped in promoting the Championships locally. This was helped by a series of articles on the Table Tennis England website which were then displayed on club, league and county websites. At the June meeting, Sally Lockyer was able to outline how the post-event evaluation was proceeding along with the steps being taken to secure the legacy of the Championships.

Key Presentations

During the year, we had detailed presentations from Gavin Evans (Director of Table Tennis Performance) and from Jack Ramful (Director of Engagement).

Gavin explained that in building a coaching system for the future it was necessary to address the long-standing issue that whilst a large number of players attended coaching courses, a much smaller number became active coaches. The new approach focuses on coach development and supporting coaches throughout their coaching journey. A key partnership is with the Chartered Institute for the Management of Sport and Physical Activity (CIMSPA). This will align TTE coaching qualifications and workforce development with the professional standards framework for sport and physical activity.

Jack introduced the new membership management system – TTE Hub. Initially this would simply replace the existing Sport80/TT Memberships but the capabilities of the system would mean that it would provide a platform for unifying most of the systems that are currently in use in TTE. Accordingly, TTE Hub will be a key element of TTE's wider Digital Transformation programme. This aims to produce a thriving, connected table tennis community growing in numbers, loyalty, and impact.

The presentations from Gavin and from Jack have been published on the National Council website.



Finance and Affiliation Fees

At the April meeting, Paul Bishop (Chair of the Board's Finance & Audit Committee) shared with us his thinking on affiliation fees for the forthcoming season along with some initial thoughts on fees for subsequent seasons. His approach was based on the need to deliver a balanced budget year-on-year. National Councillors were invited to share with Paul their views on affiliation fees for 2025/26 and subsequent years. The Board has now set affiliation fees for 2025/26, and these are broadly in line with previous TTE commitments and what was suggested by National Councillors.

This year, Paul and Samantha Garey (TTE - Finance & IT) set up an online meeting to discuss TTE finances ahead of the Annual General Meeting. This provided additional insight into the finances of TTE as well as the opportunity to ask more detailed questions than is feasible within the constraints of the AGM. This initiative by Paul was welcomed by National Councillors and we hope it will be a regular feature of how the TTE Board interacts with the membership on financial issues.

Members Meeting and the Annual Review

National Council was disappointed that at the 2025 AGM there was only limited opportunity to discuss the Annual Review. Through National Council, the suggestion was made that such discussions would be best facilitated by a separate face-to-face meeting specifically focused on the Annual Review. The Board has responded positively to this suggestion, and we understand plans are in place to hold a "Members Meeting" in the autumn that will provide the engagement that we have requested.

Improving National Council Input into Policy and Decision Making

We are always looking for ways to improve National Council's input into the development of policy and strategy. We believe that our input will be more valuable if it is made at an early stage in the consultation process. We have made some suggestions on how this might be achieved and these suggestions have been welcomed by the TTE Chair and TTE Chief Executive. We will be working on this over the summer with the view to putting the new arrangements in place for the first meeting of the new season.

Finally, we would like to take this opportunity to thank all our National Councillor colleagues for ensuring that meetings are conducted in an orderly fashion and which (usually!) run to time.

GBTT

GBTT, made up of all the Home Nations, has nominated Table Tennis England through a Memorandum of Understanding to receive the investment from UK Sport and lead the GB Performance programme.

Gavin Evans, the Performance Director, reports to the GBTT board, where investment is managed and performance ambitions are supported.

GBTT's strategic priorities in the last year have been the following:

Development environments

Continue to optimise player development through utilisation of the Elite Training Centre for centralised training, coaching and camps, expansion of the Pathway Development Centre network, and integration of strategic sparring opportunities to enhance skill development and training variety.

Coaching & Coach Development

Implement the new Coach Development Framework to engage and develop a coaching workforce to enable high-quality player experiences throughout the pathway, aligned to the Player Development Framework.

Home Nation Alignment (/Collaboration)

Collaborate with the Home Nations to enable alignment to the GB Player Development Framework and the Coach Development Framework to increase the collective strength of the player potential in Great Britain, with the ultimate aim of maximising competitive performance potential as GB.

As well as the above, for LA2028 Olympic Games our ambition and target is to achieve two top-eight finishes. Over the last year we have seen some positive steps forward as a Performance system and have realised some very encouraging results. As a Mixed Team, GB are currently ranked world No 20.

The performances of athletes on the GB pathway are

covered elsewhere in this Annual Report. Most notably, Anna Hursey won gold in the Under-19 Girls' Doubles at the ITTF World Youth Championships, where she also picked up silver in Mixed Doubles and bronze in Girls' Singles.

Anna also won gold in the Mixed Doubles at the European Under-21 Championships and Singles gold, Mixed Doubles silver and Girls' Doubles bronze at the European Youth Championships.

Connor Green won two bronze medals, in Men's Singles and Men's Doubles, at the European Under-21 Championships and there was also standout success at WTT events and in the world rankings for Connor and for Tom Jarvis and Tin-Tin Ho and for a number of young players on the WTT Youth circuit.

International influence

The 2025/2026 season for the International Table Tennis Federation (ITTF) was centred around three main areas.

The first one was to finalise the 2025 AGM which unfortunately had been previously suspended. Following a very thorough legal process the AGM resumed on 15 November. The Executive Board were elected, the Council members and the committee chairs and membership were ratified.

Richard Scruton and Phil McCallum (Scotland), who had been elected as European Council members, now sit on the ITTF Council. Following some difficult issues on the Nominations Committee the current chair resigned and I was appointed as chair.

As 2026 represented the centenary of the establishment of the ITTF, it was agreed at the 2025 ITTF AGM to review the current constitution and bring to the next AGM a new and revised Centenary Constitution to take the sport forward into the next 100-year milestone.

The newly formulated Executive Board along with the ITTF governance manager concentrated on the constitutional review. The ITTF member associations were continually consulted and updated. As the chair of the Nominations Committee, I too was very much involved.

This was presented and agreed at the AGM held at the ITTF World Team Table Tennis Championships Finals in London. It was an honour to be given the opportunity to celebrate this incredible milestone in the city where it all began.

The ITTF Board and executive were very much part of the delivery of these iconic Championships, along with the Board of Table Tennis International Events, executives from Table Tennis England and support from UK Sport.

Also at the ITTF annual summit and AGM during the Championships, one of the difficult issues to be presented was the finances of World Table Tennis. The ITTF Board and executive gave assurances to address the financial difficulties and have already commenced a significant restructure.

I worked very closely with the ITTF governance manager to put together the nomination forms for the Athletes Commission. This presented an opportunity to help English performance players to influence the structure of competitions and events. The election took place at the World Team Championships.

I am delighted to report both Paul Drinkhall and Charlotte Carey were elected to the Commission. Jack Hunter-Spivey was one of the two para athletes to also become a member.

Following the formation of the Commission, Paul Drinkhall was appointed as a co-chair, which now gives him a seat and a vote on the ITTF Executive Board.



Following the commencement of the new Constitution, I have once again been appointed to the ITTF Nominations Committee. This is formulated with five continental members and three independent persons. I am the European representative member.





European Table Tennis Union

The Executive Board of the European Table Tennis Union continues to meet on a monthly basis, sometimes physically at events and other times online.

The European Youth Championships were held in Ostrava from July 11 to 20 with 48 National Associations represented with more than 560 player participants competing on 24 tables. There were team events, singles, doubles and mixed doubles over a 10-day period, for both genders. The atmosphere was electric and the desire to win incredible. It was so good to see a full contingent of English players and coaches.

Over the past few years the ETTU Executive Board have introduced the concept of a webinar to go through details of the previous year's financial statements and balance, the current year's financial position and the following year's budget. This was held on October 1 2025, with over 40 member associations joining.

This gives the membership the opportunity to receive very detailed financial information and allows for more intense scrutiny and subsequent questions.

The International Standard audit company PKF Conseil were also in attendance to give their report, and Josh Reynolds gave the internal audit commission report. The webinar is recorded and the link sent to all the membership.

The Congress was held in Zadar, Croatia and all the finances were presented for consideration and unanimously agreed. In addition, a few propositions were presented to the membership and agreed. Sweden, France and Germany put forward a resolution to consider a level of change to the European Youth Championships. This did not receive the required 50% votes.

As is the normal practice with the ETTU, all youth competitions have been reviewed and a survey sent out to all the membership. As a result of the insight from the review and survey, a number of propositions will be put to the next congress.

The financial result of 2024 showed a significant surplus. It was announced at the congress this would be used over a period of two years to enhance events and increase development activity.

The 2025/6 financial year has seen significant exposure of the sport through television production throughout Europe and parts of Asia. This investment has resulted in increased income which has been reinvested into membership opportunities.

The development programme was enhanced with direct income from the ETTU. A significant performance opportunity named EUROSPIN has been established. This takes the form of a training opportunity for a number of identified young talented players to train with the Korean performance teams both in Korea and Europe. The ETTU are looking to expand the programme to include other Asian countries.

2027 will see the European Para Championships being organised for the first time by the ETTU. It will be held as part of a multi-sport para event in Switzerland.

The highly successful Champions League Men's final four competition has continued with increased sponsorship, television exposure and more than 2,500 spectators in attendance. This year saw the introduction of the Champions League Women's final four event held in Poland. As experienced with the men, the women's event produced a strong platform on which to build yet another successful concept.

I continue to work closely with the President and secretariat to strategically look at roles and responsibilities of all the staffing structure, sponsorship and television contracts as well as good governance.

Performance

The 2025/26 season saw TTE and GB players deliver a series of outstanding performances across major European and World Championship events, underlining the strength of the GB performance pathway and the continued progression of both senior and youth players on the international stage.

ITTF World Team Table Tennis Championships Finals

The unique London 2026 World Championships format gave our athletes the chance to take on three of the best men's and three of the best women's teams in the world and although there were no team victories, we were close to some extraordinary individual victories. The women acquitted themselves well in defeat by Ukraine in the last 32 and the men lost out 3-2 to Brazil in the last 16, which was a bitter pill for the team to swallow, as they came close to securing a quarter-final place.

Overall, the Championships served as a good gauge of where our teams are now and what we can learn to close the gap to the top. The less experienced members of the squad, particularly a young female squad, will benefit greatly from the exposure on the world stage, while the more experienced players were able to move up the rankings as a result, opening up more opportunities on the global circuit.

ITTF World Youth Championships

Anna Hursey produced one of the standout performances of the year, winning gold in Under-19 Girls' Doubles, silver in Mixed Doubles and bronze in Girls' Singles.

European Under-21 Championships

Anna Hursey delivered a historic performance by winning gold in the Mixed Doubles, completing a remarkable clean sweep at the championships, having won Women's Singles and Women's Doubles gold in

2025. Her achievement established her status as one of the world's leading young players.

European Youth Championships

Building on her world championship success, Anna Hursey captured Under-19 Girls' Singles gold and added Mixed Doubles silver and Girls' Doubles bronze. Her performances highlighted remarkable consistency across multiple events and confirmed her position among the continent's elite junior players. The Junior boys team also put in a fantastic performance and secured promotion to the Top 16 at the 2026 Championships.





Europe Youth Top 10

Connor Green also achieved a bronze medal in the Under-19 Boys' Singles at the Europe Youth Top 10 competition, further demonstrating his ability to compete with the very best players in his age group.

WTT Events

England players continued to make a strong impact across the World Table Tennis circuit, collecting medals at senior and youth events around the world and gaining valuable experience in high-level international competition.

At WTT Star Contender London, England celebrated home success with bronze medals in Men's Doubles and Mixed Doubles, showcasing the strength of the doubles programme against world-class opposition. Tom Jarvis enjoyed a particularly consistent season on the feeder circuit, winning silver in Düsseldorf and bronze medals in Vila Nova de Gaia and Otocec.

Connor Green & Tin-Tin Ho emerged as England's most successful mixed doubles pairing, claiming gold in Düsseldorf, silver in Otocec and bronze at WTT Contender Zagreb. The pairing are currently ranked at a record-breaking 26 in the world.

In women's events, Tin-Tin Ho & Anna Hursey secured Women's Doubles bronze in Düsseldorf, while Hursey added a Women's Singles silver medal at the March 2026 Düsseldorf feeder, underlining her continued transition into senior-level competition.

WTT youth events

England's younger athletes enjoyed an excellent year on the WTT Youth Contender circuit, winning medals across events in Slovenia, Georgia, Slovakia, Saudi Arabia, Tunisia, Portugal, Bulgaria, Serbia and Kosovo. The standout performer was Dimitar Dimitrov, who claimed Under-13 Boys' Singles gold in Bulgaria and added multiple silver and bronze medals throughout the season, demonstrating impressive consistency across the international circuit.

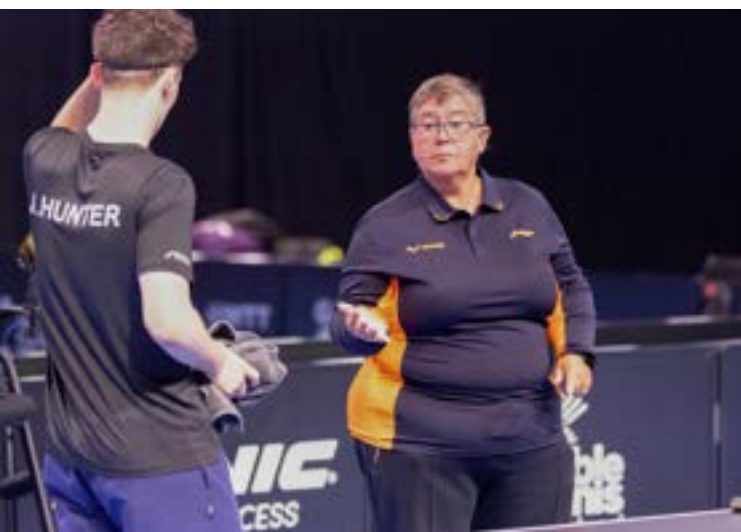

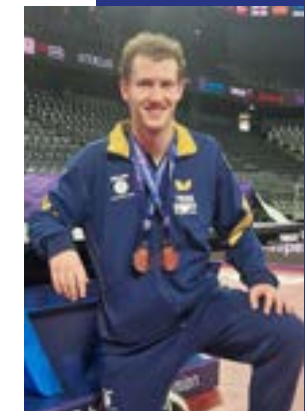

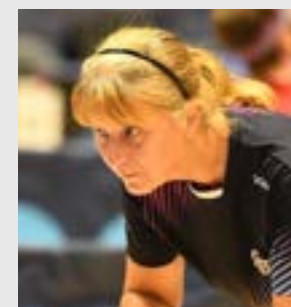

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In Memoriam

Gorazd Vecko MBE: The son of former world and European table tennis champion Edvard Vecko, Gorazd coached Mateja Pintar to win the first Paralympic gold medal for Slovenia in table tennis at Athens 2004 and was recruited by British Para Table Tennis in 2009.

He proved to be an inspired choice, transforming the British Para Table Tennis programme, establishing a high-performance base in Sheffield and introducing a 'family culture' that allowed athletes to flourish and achieve their potential.

Under his leadership the British team won four medals at London 2012 and three at Rio 2016, including gold for Will Bayley (men's class 7 singles) and Rob Davies (men's class 1 singles).

At Tokyo 2020 the team secured seven medals, marking its most successful Paralympic Games in the modern era, and this was followed by five medals at Paris 2024.

A Vice-President of Table Tennis England, Gorazd was awarded an Honorary MBE by His Majesty King Charles III in 2023 for his services to British Para Table Tennis.

Jose Ransome: A Canadian international player and Chief Executive of the Canadian Table Tennis Association - the first female CEO of any Canadian sport - Jose returned to the UK in 1976 to take on the role for Table Tennis England as Assistant Director of the 1977 World Championships in Birmingham.

Since then, Jose was heavily involved in the ETTA, Commonwealth Association, Cleveland County and the Ormesby Club, as President of the latter for 30 years. She was a great help to her husband Alan during his years as ETTA Chair and Deputy Chair.

As Chairman of the ETTA Women's Committee, she was responsible for the introduction of one of the main female competitions the Women's British League, which has been running successfully ever since.

Jose played a major role in the Commonwealth Table Tennis Association, working effectively as secretary for the 29 years that Alan was Chair.

She became an ETTA Vice-President in 2014 and also received the Malcolm Scott Award (1993), the Maurice Goldstein Merit Award (1999) and the Pat Archdale Women in Table Tennis Trophy (1993). Canada TTA honoured her in 1971 with the Percy McLeod Memorial Award for contribution towards the promotion and development of table tennis in Canada.

Jia-Yi Liu: Arrived at the ETTA in 1994 in the role of National Junior Coach, having previously been National Coach at both the Chinese TTA and Dubai TTA, as well as working personally with Chen Xinhua, the former Chinese world gold medallist who later represented England.

Jia-Yi went on to be Performance Director (1997-98), National Coach (1998-2000), National Coaching Manager (2000-07), Head Performance Coach (2007-11) and National Performance Coach (2011-13), before taking up the National Coach role with Singapore TTA from 2014-19. His tenure coincided with success on the international stage at both Junior and Senior Level, including taking Paul Drinkhall to a silver medal at the World Junior Championships in 2008.

He became an ETTA Vice-President in 2012.

Philip Lewis MBE: One of the founders of the British Table Tennis Association for the Disabled, now known as British Para Table Tennis, Philip was a medallist at the Paralympic Games in 1972 and at the Commonwealth Games in 1966 and 1974.

Chairman of the British Sports Association for the Disabled (now Activity Alliance), he went on to be founding Chairman of BTAD from 1993 until 2003, becoming President in 2015 and also served as a Vice-President of Table Tennis England.

David Hockney: Avon TTA Chair and National Councillor, member of committees including British League, Voting Review Group and, most notably, Standing Orders Committee. Table Tennis England Vice-President 2018.

David Creamer: England Junior and Senior International and national Men's Doubles champion, who went on to have a successful career as a professional golfer.

Beate Nicol: A popular umpire who started her officiating journey at St Neots TTC and was one of the team of English officials selected to umpire at the Games in Birmingham in 2022. A regular at the Women's British Clubs League, and in the 2023-24 season was awarded the Solihull Trophy, awarded to a coach, official or player who most enhanced the competition during the season, based on the most nominations from clubs.

Ted Wallbutton: ETTA Chief Executive from 1987 to 1990.
